CODDINGTON, WILLIAM JOHN, Rifleman, No. 200835, 18th (Service) Battn. The King's Royal Rifle Corps, *s.* of Robert Francis Coddington, of 99, Commerell Street, East Greenwich, S.E. ; *b.* East Greenwich, co. Kent, 31 March, 1886 ; educ. Culvert Road County Council School there ; enlisted in the King's Royal Rifle Corps 3 June, 1916 ; served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders, and was killed in action 23 Aug. 1918. Buried three and three-quarter miles north-west of Bapaume. His Major wrote : ". . . He fought nobly, and died a brave man's death. His loss is deeply mourned by all his officers and comrades." He *m.* at Christ Church, East Greenwich, S.E., 27 Oct. 1912. Ethel (75, Old Woolwich Road, East Greenwich, S.E.), dau. of the late William Saunders, and had three children : Ernest Henry Walter and William John Charles (twins), *b.* 1 Oct. 1916, and Ethel E. M., *b.* 17 Feb. 1913.
