**FOX, FRANK HERBERT**, 2nd Lieut., 1st Battn. (16th Foot) The Bedfordshire Regt., yr. and only survg. s. of Frederick Isaac Fox, of Cavendish Place, Beeston, co. Nottingham, City Treasurer, by his wife, Kate, dau. of Robert Burrill Earp, of Nottingham; *b.* Beeston aforesaid, 17 March, 1898; educ. privately; joined the Nottingham University College O.T.C. in April, 1916, and the Officers' Cadet Battn. at Oxford in March, 1917; gazetted 2nd Lieut. 7th (Service) Battn. The Bedfordshire Regt. in Aug. following; served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders from the following month; transferred to the 1st Battn., and joined that unit in Italy in Dec.; returned to France the following March, and was killed in action at Achiet-le-Petit 23 Aug. 1918. Buried in the Achiet-le-Petit Cemetery. Major Chermiside, commanding the 1st Battn. The Bedfordshire Regt., wrote: "He died a soldier's death, leading his men in a manner reflecting the highest credit both to himself and to the regiment," and the Chaplain:
