Sherborne School, where he was awarded a scholarship on passing from the preparatory to the school; was awarded a Gold Medal for Classics, and was also secretary of the School Archaeological Society, and of the O.T.C.; he was a Scholar-Elect of Keble College, Oxford; obtained a commission 2 Feb. 1915; served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders; was awarded the Military Cross [London Gazette, 27 July, 1916], for conspicuous gallantry in taking a mine crater by bombing with half a dozen men, though wounded early in the action, and was killed in action at Les Bœufs 31 Oct. 1916. Buried there; *unm.*

VOKES, HAROLD WILLIAM, Private, No. 30576, 1st Battn. (15th Foot) The East Yorkshire Regt., s. of Private George William Vokes, Northumberland Fusiliers, by his wife, Ada (Barrow-on-Humber), dau. of William (and Betsy) Brown, of Hull; b. Hull, co. York, 1 April, 1899; educ. Church of England Schools there; was apprenticed to Messrs. Harland's, Printers, Hull; enlisted in the East Yorkshire Regt. 2 April, 1917; served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders from 31 March, 1918, and died a prisoner of war in German hands at the dressing station, Houthern, east of Mont Hemmel, 26 April following, from wounds received in action. Buried there; *unm.*

VOSE, JAMES EDWARD, Private, No. 38769, 1st Battn. (5th Foot) The Northumberland Fusiliers, s. of Walter Vose, of 112, Don Road, Sheffield, by his wife, Ellen, dau. of Maria Brown; b. Sheffield, co. York, 30 Nov. 1896; educ. Newhall Council School; enlisted in the Northumberland Fusiliers 13 April, 1916; served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders from June, and died at No. 45 Casualty Clearing Station 27 Dec. 1917, of wounds received in action. Buried in Achiet-le-Grand Communal Cemetery Extension, three and three-quarter miles north-west of Bapaume; *unm.*

WADDELL, JAMES, Private, No. 304955, 14th Battn. The Tank Corps, s. of James Waddell, of The School House, Roberton, co. Lanark, Schoolmaster, by his wife, Williamina, dau. of William Hastie, of Millport, co. Bute; b. Wishaw, co. Lanark, 18 Dec. 1898; educ. Roberton Public School; was engaged in the Torpedo Factory, Greenock; enlisted in the Gordon Highlanders 8 June, 1917; transferred to the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders 12 Nov. following, and to the Tank Corps 27 Dec. of the same year; served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders; was taken prisoner during the fighting at Rosières, north of Amiens, 9 Aug. 1918, and died a prisoner of war at Gladbach, Germany, 25 Oct. following, of diphtheria. Buried in the cemetery there. His Commanding Officer was...
